He and his lovely wife of 50 years, Lois flew everywhere together in his beautiful Cessna 310 from his Wayne's Aviation Corp. out of Camarillo airport. He was a Christian gentleman who never forgot his roots and his humble beginnings. I hope that the membership will remember and miss him as I surely always will."

Government Relations

Remember, I promised an interview this month. Well, I couldn't think of a better person to start off with than the former Government Relations Chairperson and

recent law school graduate, Denise Goldner.

Marilynn: "Denise, now that you have your doctorate degree in law and you finished your legal research paper on Constitutional issues, please share with us some of your thoughts and updates on our privileges as a private organization." Denise: "Yes, in April, I finished a directed legal research paper entitled, "Constitutional and State Regulation Issues Faced by Elks Lodges in California." There are actually two doctrines that arise out of the constitutional right of Freedom of Association. Freedom of Intimate Association has to do with starting and maintaining close personal relationships. It is evidenced by the smallness of the group, a high degree of selectivity, and seclusion from others in important aspects of the association. Like the Jaycees, Rotary and Boy Scouts in landmark cases, the Elks lack these distinctive characteristics to afford constitutional protection under Intimate Association. However, we do have Freedom of Expressive Association, which has to do with associating for the purposes of expressing speech, i.e. sending a message. If the message is diluted, fractured or impeded, then there is a violation of the organization's Freedom of Expressive Association."

Marilyn: "What is the Elks' message?"

Denise: "The Elks' message is found in the Preamble to its Constitution."

Marilynn: "I have it right here, it reads, 'To inculcate the principles of Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity; to recognize a belief in God; to promote the welfare and enhance the happiness of its members; to quicken the spirit of American patriotism; to cultivate good fellowship; to perpetuate itself as a fraternal organization; and to provide for its government, the Benevolent and Protective Order or Elks of the United States of America...'

Denise: "For example, notice the references to "God" and "American patriotism." Because of these references, the Elks organization is protected from being forced to accept persons who are not U.S. citizens and do not believe in God-it would dilute or "fracture" our message."

Marilynn: "Thank you for this educational information. It is greatly appreciated."



PURPLE HEART ANNIVERSARY

General George Washington on August 7, 1782 ordered the creation of a Badge of Military Merit. The Badge consisted of a purple cloth heart with a silver braded edge. Only 3 have been known to have been awarded during the Revolutionary War. Two of these coveted badges still exist.

Although this was the medal of honor of the Revolution, it seems to have been forgotten for about 150 years. The award



The Purple Heart is perhaps one of the most beautifully designed of all U.S. decorations; the Medal is a purple heart shaped Badge with bronze edges that depicts a profile relief bust of Washington in the uniform of a general in the Continental Army. The reverse side bears the inscription "For Military Merit" with the recipients name enscribed.
