Richard was the first CHEA recipient of the cherished Marvin Lewis Award and a three time winner of the Lord Baden-Powell Scouting Award. He is also a Life Member of the National Eagle Scout Association

Richard has been active in Ritual as a winning performer, coach, and judge. As an Exalted Ruler, his Lodge was one of

the most publicized in Elkdom; receiving CHEA & Grand Lodge All-American Lodge recognition.

Public awareness of Elk activities and community service became a national Emphasis Program. Richard accepted the assignment of Public Relations Chairman in the West Central Coast District and then State Association Chairman. In recognition of his committee leaderships, Richard received Outstanding District Public Relations Chairman Awards, "Golden Mike" CHEA Awards, and consecutive Grand Lodge Outstanding Achievement Awards.

He graduated from Upsala College in East Orange, New Jersey, was an Air Force Officer, received the Air Force Commendation Medal, worked at the Apollo Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston and received NASA Excellence Awards for Apollo 8 and 11. Richard then focused on civilian endeavors at Sperry Univac as Director of Marketing, General Electric Software International as Regional Vice President, and currently Xerox Corporation as Vice President XSIS Sales and Customer Operations.

Richard is a Past Lieutenant Governor and Life Member of Optimist International, a Life Member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a member of the American Legion. He has been married to his wife, Elaine, for 38-years and has two children; both Elks. Daughter Denise recently graduated with a Juris Doctorate degree. Son, Rick, has a Masters of Business Administration Degree and is employed by Ventura County Superior Courts.



Our bond account advanced by about \$20,000 in one night thanks to a very informative bond information meeting/ free dinner put on by our Lodge Officers. This was a nice shot

in the arm but we still need to work some more on members that have not yet pitched in to help.

I would like to remind everyone, this investment is going to pay interest to the bond holders from the day they receive their bond. This is not a grant, not a donation but a loan to your lodge and an investment in its future. We need every member's help in this endeavor. We have come a long way but we need to keep up the work if we want to realize the dream of a new lodge building.

On the construction side, Len Cardoni has put together a revised preliminary floor plan of the proposed building. Those that attended the Bond dinner last month were able to see it. The plans are available for your input and will be on display in the lounge. Please address all of your design concerns in written form to either the Exalted Ruler or myself. This lodge building will be our new home for many years to come and we want to make sure that the needs of the members are addressed in the design of the building.

The bidding for the General Contractor on this project has been narrowed down to 3 contractors. All three are local contractors and have experience in building similar buildings. They are all contacting me weekly to see if we are ready to have them finalize their bids and start construction.



The only thing holding up the back hoes from starting to dig is the availability of funds. If you are reading this article and have not yet purchased a bond and are in a financial position to do so, you are holding up this project. If you feel that this is not a good investment or you do not want a

new lodge building, please come and talk with me and voice your concerns. All we are asking is that each member, spouse of a member or spouse of a deceased member, or associate member participate to the best of their ability.



## GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

The Lodge has a lot of new members since I last served as Government Relations Chairperson back in 2000 and 2001. So, for the newer members and those who are not sure what the purpose of the Government Relations committee is---read on!

The purpose of the Elks Government Relations Program is to help protect our Order's right to exist as a private organization and to monitor any legislation that could negatively impact our exercise of this freedom. It is our fundamental right under the 1st Amendment, commonly known as "Freedom of Association" to remain private and have discriminatory requirements for members of our organization in accordance with the Preamble to the Elks Constitution, so long as it is not gender-based (a lã the Supreme Court decision re: Rotary International).

To assist in this regard, our Lodge subscribes to a quarterly newsletter from a California organization called CONPOR (Conference of Private Organizations). The purpose of this group is to monitor and evaluate proposed legislation and to share the information with various private organizations. The State Chairman of CONPOR, Mr. Yubi G. Separovich, oversees this publication and is an Elk member himself.

The Lodge Government Relations Committee is also to keep current information on all our government representatives from the local to the national level and how to contact them. Using the recommended website, www.vote-smart.org, you can look up the various government representatives and contact them via e-mail. For those who would rather write, the information has been posted on one of the Lodge bulletin boards.

This committee needs another member! The committee work does not take a lot of time, but it is an important and necessary position within the Lodge. Please consider it!


