
gladdened our heart and made our day.




BRANSON MEETS THOUSAND OAKS

NEW FACILITIES

The time has come to turn up the heat on the fund raising for our new lodge. A major problem has been discovered in our existing building. A small leak over the kitchen has apparently existed for quite some time. The rust holding back the majority of the water finally

gave way a few weeks ago and water from the leaking evaporative cooler came rushing into the lodge. Some of you may have been rained on when you walked between the lounge and the lodge room. To fix the leak properly will involve removal of the air conditioning units, the sheet metal roof saddle and adjacent roofing. Only then will we be able to see the extent of any structural damage that may have occurred below the area of the leak. It is suspected to be extensive as the wood that could be seen under the leak area was rotten and evidence of extensive damage can be seen in the kitchen ceiling. This repair could cost us \$10,000 or more and will involve shutting down the air conditioning for an extended period of time. A patch has been put over the leak area that is accessible. This patch by no means corrects the problem; it only acts as a temporary band-aid to slow down the infiltration of water into the building.

With the foregoing in mind, we need to ask ourselves, does it make good business sense to put \$10,000 into a building we are going to tear down? We also need to be realistic; this is not the only major repair that is going to be required in the near future. One look at our aged roofing will attest to that. Add to the cost of repairs of our present building the inflation costs we are incurring every day we delay the construction and you don't need to be much of a mathematician to realize we are wasting time and money.

There is a solution. Every member needs to join our effort to raise the other half of the funds needed to start construction. I know everyone is not able to purchase a bond and some are able to purchase more than others. All we are asking is that you loan the lodge, through your bond purchase, as much as you are able. You can also help by supporting our fund raisers.

Now for the construction update. Len Cardoni has been working on the revised floor plan and has met with the city to get their approval for the appearance of the outside of the building. A contractor has been called in to give us some hard costs of construction based upon a metal structure building. The metal refers only to the support structure of the building. It will have all appearances from the inside and outside of a frame and stucco building. The revised floor plan and revised rendering of the new lodge should be on display in the lounge by the time you are reading this.

In closing, let me remind you, we have already applied for our first building permit. This building will be built and moneys are already being spent for the first phase. The only question remaining is when will the construction actually start? The construction start date is completely dependent upon our members. I am sure that there are numerous members out there who are able to buy bonds but have not done so. If you are able to and have not, what does it take to convince



service. And I sincerely hope that you will all get it eventually. It will hurt our pocket book, but at least we will have a lot of dedicated members.

And that's 30 for this month. Hope everyone had a terrific if hot summer vacation.

CATHERINE'S COMMUNICATION: FLAG RETIREMENT CEREMONY

Laws of the United States state: "When the flag is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning".

Once a year we perform a ceremony to retire unserviceable flags in a dignified manner. We do this by ceremoniously lowering them into our own funeral pyre. This ceremony takes place next to the Office, where the pyre is located. Boy and/or Girl Scouts who perform their own ceremony as well as a representative of Thousand Oaks City accompany the Officers of our Lodge.

There is no charge for this service and if you have an American Flag you wish to retire, please bring to the Lodge before October 17th. We have receptacles present at every BBQ on Saturdays.

Please join us on Sun, October 17th at 1:00 pm for the Flag Retirement Ceremony. We will have an Ice-cream social immediately following in the Lodge.

THE TOLLING OF 11 STROKES:

With the passing of our recently departed brothers, I felt this piece of trivia to be very appropriate. Many of our new members are not aware of the significance of this Toast and what it means in the hearts of Elks. The official 11 O'clock Toast is posted near the Jute Box in our Lounge. There are many wonderful and moving variations of the 11 O'clock toast that I will be sharing with you in later publications.

Origin of the Toast

In regard to the Elks 11 O'clock Toast and its origin, we have to go back long before the BPOE came into existence. One of the main contributions of Charles Richardson -- in stage name of Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian and founder of the American branch of the Jolly Corks -- was to deliver into the hands of newborn Elks the rituals and traditions of a fraternal organization started in England around 1010 A.D., the Royal and Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes, to which he belonged prior to coming to New York. The RAOB, or Buffaloes as we shall henceforth refer to them, also practiced an 11 o'clock toast in remembrance of the Battle of Hastings in October of 1066. Following his victory, William of Normandy imported a set of rules, both martial and civil in nature, to keep control of a seething Norman-Saxon population always on the edge of a revolution.

Among those rules was a curfew law requiring all watch fires, bonfires (basically all lights controlled by private citizens that could serve as signals) to be extinguished at 11 each night. From strategically placed watchtowers that also served as early fire-alarm posts, the call would go out to douse or shutter all lights and bank all fires. This also served to discourage secret and treasonous meetings, as chimney sparks stood out against the black sky. A person away from his home and out on the darkened streets, when all doors were barred for the night, risked great peril from either evildoers or patrolling militia.

The hour of 11 quickly acquired a somber meaning, and in the centuries that followed, became the synonym throughout Europe for someone on his deathbed or about to go into battle: i.e." His family gathered about his bed at the 11th hour," or "The troops in the trenches hastily wrote notes to their families as the 11th hour approached when they must charge over the top."

Thus, when the 15 Jolly Corks (of whom seven were not native-born Americans) voted on February 16, 1868, to start a more formal and official organization, they were already aware of an almost universally prevalent sentiment about the mystic and haunting aura connected with the nightly hour of 11, and it took no great eloquence by Vivian to establish a ritual toast similar to that of the Buffaloes at the next-to-last hour each day.

The great variety of 11 O'clock Toasts, including the Jolly Corks Toast, makes it clear that there was no fixed and official version until 1906-10. Given our theatrical origins, it was almost mandatory that the pre-1900 Elks would be expected to compose a beautiful toast extemporaneously at will. Regardless of the form, however, the custom is as old as the Elks.

They don't call me the Lecturing Knight for nothing!!!


