On Sunday April 30th a Court of Honor was held at the Rockwell Science Center for Cassidy Edward Tepper as he received the Eagle Challenge by his leaders which describes the responsibilities of the Eagle Scout. The Thousand Oaks Elks Lodge is proud to sponsor his BSA Troop 754 and that Cassidy is the 32nd Eagle Scout to be so honored. Scouting Committee Chairman Bill Miller presented him a certificate of appreciation and displayed the Lodge plaque of all Eagle Scouts that earned this high honor.

A large part of Scouting is community service. Cassidy has volunteered to help with the Eagle projects of his fellow scouts and has participated in many flag retirement ceremonies, beach cleanups, numerous Scouting for Food drives, and a number of other activities. He accumulated 42 community service hours in addition to his Eagle Project.

Cassidy completed his Eagle Scout Service Project by rebuilding a damaged one-mile section of park trail in the Cheseboro Canyon National Park. 30 scouts, youth, and adults worked a total of 180 volunteer hours over 3 separate days in August, 2004 to help.

Cassidy planned the entire project and solicited donated supplies from local businesses. He asked his aunts and uncles to provide lunch for his volunteers. His team repaired the trail slope, replaced damage water bars with rocks moved from elsewhere in the park, and smoothed out the trail. Cassidy ensured that his volunteers met safety and quality standards as they assisted him on this work. He illustrated the commitment and leadership required of an Eagle Scout in planning, coordinating, and ensuring the completion of the entire project.

As a result of these efforts, scores of runners, hikers and bikers can again enjoy this part of the Cheseboro Canyon Park Trail. Thanks to all who volunteered their time to make Cassidy's Project a great success!





and the generosity of our members should be able to overcome that obstacle.

The land survey has been completed and the results will be given to the architect to be incorporated into the final building plans. We are still negotiating with the school district for a reciprocal parking agreement but that is just a matter of getting all of the insurance and paperwork in place. It is to the schools advantage as they will be able to drop children off in the morning in our parking lot rather than having the kids dropped off on the street.

A new request is being drafted for the Grand Lodge for their approval of outside funding. Several lenders are willing to lend us the balance of what will be required to fund the project. All we need to do is show Grand Lodge that we have the ability to pay back the loan. Our funding steering committee is busy putting that paperwork together and hopefully this time next month I will be able to write that the request is in. There should be no problem getting their approval as we are only asking to shift our allowed debt from strictly bonds to both bonds and outside funding. The total amount of allowed debt will not change.

Everyone has been working hard for our new lodge building. The money we are raising now, over and above bonds, is going to reduce the overall amount we will have to borrow and also to offset the ever increasing cost to build. There are some major fund raisers scheduled for our new facilities. Please support them to the maximum of your ability and remember, we still have bonds to sell and 4% is not a bad return for an investment of as little as \$500.



Shots heard round the world uplifting By Ed Jones

"By the rude bridge that arched the flood, Their flag to April's breeze unfurled Here once the embattled farmers stood and fired the shot heard round the world"

Concord Hymn, Ralph Waldo Emerson

On the morning of April 19, 1775, British troops, in search of colonial weapons, attacked and killed some American patriots in Lexington, Mass., and then marched on to Concord where a quickly organized militia waited at the bridge. The clash that followed constituted the first battle of a 6 1/2 year struggle for independence that was to become known as the American Revolution. The first shot of that war, according to the poet Ralph Waldo Emerson, was, "The shot heard round the world."

But revolutions have been fairly frequent on the world stage and for that first shot to have been immortalized, it must stand for something truly important, something that changed not only American life, but also the course of history, and, in the process, made a significant difference for the future of humankind.

Emerson said they dared, "to die, and leave their children free," but they also dared to die, probably unknowingly, to pave the way for a governmental system that would allow for everyone, everywhere to be free.

It is important to realize that liberty was the object, not also equality and fraternity as in the French Revolution nor equal distribution of property as in the Bolshevik Revolution, but rather the establishment of a government which would protect the "life, liberty and pursuit of happiness" of each and every individual, as was to be stated the following year in the Declaration of Independence - a government that would create an environment in which each individual would have the opportunity to reach his own potential of achievement.

President Lincoln was so moved by the Declaration that, he stated, "have never had a feeling politically, that did not spring from the sentiments embodied in the Declaration of Independence" and, further, that those sentiments "gave liberty not alone to the people of this country, but hope to all the world, for all future time ... that the weights would be lifted from the shoulders of all men, and that all should have an equal chance."

These great pledges of the Declaration and of the long, bloody struggle against the British were fulfilled by the Constitution. People cannot be governed by noble sentiments and nostalgia anymore than a couple can live on love. These sentiments These sentiments must be translated into a charter of government to meet the tests of everyday life.

And so they were in one long, hot summer in Philadelphia at the Constitutional Convention. In the words of political scientist James Q. Wilson, what emerged from the hands of "not wise philosophers discussing large

principles, but ... a small number of practical men" was a document that was so well-conceived and executed that it remains today the oldest written constitution in the world, sufficient for maintaining peace and order while preserving liberty.

And what of Emerson's and Lincoln's beliefs and hopes that the rest of the world would take their cues from American democracy, throw off repression and march into the golden dawn of freedom?

The spread of democracy is still a work in progress. Certainly, the 20th century was not a good one for dictators, as Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini would attest, but, conversely, it was a good century for indigenous peoples as colonial empires were dismantled around the globe.

And now as we have seen the breakup of the former Soviet Union and the glimmerings of democracy in the Middle East, I believe that we can agree with Emerson and Lincoln that the blood of our first patriots was not shed in vain, that their principles have indeed proved to be valid and that the seeds that were planted here will yet bloom in all their democratic splendor throughout the world.




