BPO Elks Pledges Aid to Victims of Hurricane Katrina

CHICAGO, ILLINOIS—With numerous counties in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama severely damaged by Hurricane Katrina, which slammed the state on August 29th, taking thousands of lives and making hundreds of thousands homeless, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the U.S.A. has pledged its assistance to hard-hit hurricane victims.

The hurricane, which pounded the city of New Orleans with particular ferocity and 145-mph winds, was the worst storm to hit the continental United States since Hurricane Andrew devastated Florida in 1992. It was the most powerful storm ever to slam New Orleans and the first direct hit on the city in 40 years. A massive evacuation of the city has begun in the wake of what may prove to be the deadliest natural disaster in the United States in at least a century.

Louis James Grillo, the national president of the BPO Elks, has asked the more than 1 million members of the Elks nationwide to lead the way in offering disaster relief.

To aid in this effort, a fund has been established by the BPO Elks Grand Lodge to assist those individuals and families who have experienced the devastating effects of the hurricane. Checks made payable to the Hurricane Katrina Elks Disaster Relief Fund should be sent to:

L. J. "JIM" GRILLO

Louis James "Jim" Grillo was born and raised in Stockton, California. Jim, a fifth-generation Stocktonian, attended Madison Elementary School, Daniel Webster Junior High School, and Amos Alonzo Stagg High School in Stockton. He graduated from California State University in Sacramento, with a degree in Criminal Justice. While in college he interned for the District Attorney's Office.

Jim was a baseball player all through high school and college, reaching the semipro level. He had aspirations of becoming a professional, until an injury ended his career. Jim then planned to enter the field of law enforcement, but at the urging of a family friend, he instead launched a successful 27-year career as a sales representative, retiring only recently.

In his youth, Jim served his community and Church, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. He and his brother, David, were the first Acolytes ever to serve at St. Stephen's. He also worked on numerous Church committees throughout his youth and young adulthood. Ultimately, he served on the Bishop's Committee for ten years, overseeing the operations of the Church.

As a teenager, Jim worked with his grandfather, Jim Fisher, at Fisher Brothers, the family's sixth-generation house moving company. From this experience, he learned the value of a hard day's work and respect for his fellow man. He also learned the lesson to never ask anyone to do anything he would not do himself.

Currently, Jim is a member of the Bersaglieri Society, called "Campo Di Bersaglieri" in Italian, one of the oldest Italian organizations in the United States. The Society originated with a group of guards who protected the Italian royal family. Jim is a third-generation member. He attended many meetings of the Society with his late grandfather Louis (Luigi) Grillo and his late father, Dr. Italo J. Grillo. For a number of years, Jim served as "The Collector" of the Society. In September of 2004, Jim was proposed for membership in the Emblem Club by his mother, Charter Member Dorothy Fisher Grillo, and Past Supreme President Betty Parsons. Jim was initiated into Stockton Emblem Club No. 226 in October, 2004.

On February 12, 1974, Jim was proposed for Elks membership by his father, who was then State Vice-President of the Central District of the California-Hawaii Elks Association. On a visit home from college, Jim was formally initiated into Stockton, California Elks Lodge No. 218, on March 26, 1974. He served

with distinction in all the Chairs and was elected to serve as Exalted Ruler for 1987-1988.

Subsequently, in 1991, he was Chairman of the Centennial Celebration for the Stockton Lodge, a celebration which included a visit from then Grand Exalted Ruler James W. Damon. Jim also was the editor of the Lodge's 100-year Commemorative Book, and was instrumental in obtaining television coverage for the Lodge's 100 years of Elkdom on the NBC Today Show. Jim is an Honorary Life Member of Stockton Lodge No. 218.

Jim has been active on various California Central District Committees and has served the Grand Lodge as District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in 1991-1992. He served the California-Hawaii Elks Association as State Indoctrination Chairman in 1994-1995, and in 1995 was appointed to serve on the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project Board of Trustees for three years. Jim served on various committees of the Major Project Board: the Continuing Education Committee (three years, one year as Chairman); the State Disabled Scholarship Committee (two years, one year as Chairman); the Insurance & Safety Committee (three years); and the Hospital Grant-North (three years, as liaison to the University of California San Francisco, Ophthalmology Department). For one year, Jim was Secretary of the Major Project Board of Trustees. In 1998-1999, Jim was First Vice-President of the California-Hawaii Elks Association, and he was elected President of the Association for 1999-2000. Currently, he is serving as District Leader of the eleven (11) Lodges in the California Central District.

Jim was on the Grand Lodge-Lodge Activities/State Associations Committee from 2000 to 2001, and was Chairman of the All-American Lodge Contest during that time. Currently, Jim is completing four years on the Board of Grand Trustees, the general financial agent of the Order and of the Elks National Home. As a Board Member, he was responsible for Building Applications West in 2001-2002; Pension Member in 2002-2003; and Approving Member in 2003-2004. In July of 2004, Jim was elected Chairman of the Board.



brief description.

This program was started in 1928 with the premise that every cent contributed would become part of its interest-earning principal, never to be spent or subtracted, and thus the core would ever continue to grow. The interest and income would then be used for the many charitable causes supported by the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. The fund was started in 1928 with a seed of \$100,000. Through dedicated management by its Board of Trustees it has grown to over \$300,000,000 today.

At the most recent National Convention in Reno, the ENF Board of Trustees approved appropriations and distributions for the 2005-2006 fiscal year of almost \$15,000,000

Our country has been faced with many difficult situations which could have led us into war, but none showed the world

our determination for peace than the events of October, 1962.

The Cuban Missile Crisis was the closest the world ever came to nuclear war. The United States armed forces were at their highest state of readiness ever and Soviet field commanders in Cuba were prepared to use battlefield nuclear weapons to defend the island if it was invaded. Luckily, thanks to the bravery of two men, President John F. Kennedy and Premier Nikita Khrushchev, war was averted.

In 1962, the Soviet Union was desperately behind the United States in the arms race. Soviet missiles were only powerful enough to be launched against Europe but U.S. missiles were capable of striking the entire Soviet Union. In late April 1962, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev conceived the idea of placing intermediate-range missiles in Cuba. A deployment in Cuba would double the Soviet strategic arsenal and provide a real deterrent to a potential U.S. attack against the Soviet Union.

Meanwhile, Fidel Castro was looking for a way to defend his island nation from an attack by the U.S. Ever since the failed Bay of Pigs invasion in 1961, Castro felt a second attack was inevitable. Consequently, he approved of Khrushchev's plan to place missiles on the island. In the summer of 1962 the Soviet Union worked quickly and secretly to build its missile installations in Cuba.

For the United States, the crisis began on October 15, 1962 when reconnaissance photographs revealed Soviet missiles under construction in Cuba. Early the next day, President John Kennedy was informed of the missile installations. Kennedy immediately organized the EX-COMM, a group of his twelve most important advisors to handle the crisis. After seven days of guarded and intense debate within the upper echelons of government, Kennedy concluded to impose a naval quarantine around Cuba. He wished to prevent

the arrival of more Soviet offensive weapons on the island. On October 22, Kennedy announced the discovery of the missile installations to the public and his decision to quarantine the island. He also proclaimed that any nuclear missile launched from Cuba would be regarded as an attack on the United States by the Soviet Union and demanded that the Soviets remove all of their offensive weapons from Cuba.

During the public phase of the Crisis, tensions began to build on both sides. Kennedy eventually ordered low-level reconnaissance missions once every two hours. On the 25th Kennedy pulled the quarantine line back and raised military readiness to DEFCON 2. Then on the 26th EX-COMM heard from Khrushchev in an impassioned letter. He proposed removing Soviet missiles and personnel if the U.S. would guarantee not to invade Cuba. October 27 was the worst day of the crisis. A U-2 was shot down over Cuba and EX-COMM received a second letter from Khrushchev demanding the removal of U.S. missiles in Turkey in exchange for Soviet missiles in Cuba. Attorney General Robert Kennedy suggested ignoring the second letter and contacted Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin to tell him of the U.S. agreement with the first.

Tensions finally began to ease on October 28 when Khrushchev announced that he would dismantle the installations and return the missiles to the Soviet Union, expressing his trust that the United States would not invade Cuba. Further negotiations were held to implement the October 28 agreement, including a United States demand that Soviet light bombers be removed from Cuba, and specifying the exact form and conditions of United States assurances not to invade Cuba.

It was a win-win situation in which the strength and power of intellect and reason overcame the strength and power of the ultimate weapons of total annihilation in the fourteen days in October, 1962.

VOTE ON NEW FACILITIES Bill Lloyd, Secreary, DL

An application is being submitted to Grand Lodge that will allow the lodge to amend our present bond sales permit. Presently the permit allows us to sell bonds up to \$1,000,000 in order to raise funds to erect our new facility. Bond sales are not what was expected, thus it is necessary to create financing in another way. In July a special meeting was held at the lodge where all members were encouraged to attend in order to determine which way we should be proceeding. By a large majority the attending members want a new facility, and left the decision of raising funds to the New Facilities Committee. We have outside financing available at a good rate and excellent payment plan.

On Wednesday, October 12, 2005 a vote will be taken by the members present to file for an amendment to our present permit. This amendment will allow the lodge to raise the \$1,000,000 by a combination of selling bonds and outside financing. Nothing else in the permit will change except the ability to use outside financing. All members are encouraged to attend this meeting and cast their vote. Remember, if you don't vote, then don't complain about the results of the ballot.

NEW FACILITIESGreg Metzgus. PER

The Soils Engineer, Civil Engineer and Structural Engineer are at work along with our Architect Len Cardoni putting together an estimated cost for the foundation of our new building and the various fees that will be required by the city. The conceptual grading plan is complete and being sent to the city showing exactly how the building will set on our lots. The soils sample is in the lab as I write and we should be getting that result back soon. Len Cardoni will be meeting with Claudia Pedroso at The Department of Building and Safety to finalize the driveway positioning, traffic flow and how all of that is related to our new lodge. In short, we are moving ahead albeit at the slow rate at which a project of this magnitude moves at this stage.

Meanwhile, money is still an issue. Each member should have been notified via the Antler Antics of a vote to be taken concerning financing. Please read the proposal carefully and be there to cast your vote.

Many continue to ask why we have not contacted the metal building people that advertise on the radio. We have, they have yet to get a positive response from them. I am speculating that the location of the building in the City of Thousand Oaks is the big problem. As everyone that has tried to build even a patio cover in this town knows, our city is one of the more difficult areas to deal with. We are continuing to look for cheaper ways to build our building but at this point it looks like conventional wood framing will be the construction method used.

Thank you to everyone for their support in this venture. We are moving ahead and things should start moving at a faster pace once we get through the foundation stage.

Travel agents, bus owners, cruise lines or any other vendors arranging such events must indemnify the Lodge and preferably name the Lodge as an additional insured under the arranger's general liability insurance policy.

If members have formed recreational clubs such as RV, motorcycle or auto clubs, etc. the Lodge should not santion or recognize such groups an an affiliate of the Lodge. This is not to say that a member of a Lodge can't form such groups, but they must not be recognized as part of the Lodge operations. Such activities are separate from the Lodge. The participants in such groups are fully respnsible for activities of the group as well as any claims arising out of the activities of the group.
