



PRESIDENTS DAY: History of the Holiday

The original version of the holiday was in commemoration of George Washington's birthday in 1796. Washington, according to the calendar that has been used since at least the mid-18th century, was born on February 22, 1732. According to the old style calendar in use back then, however, he was born on February 11. At least in 1796, many Americans celebrated his birthday on the 22nd while others marked the occasion on the 11th instead.

By the early 19th century, Washington's Birthday had taken firm root in the American experience as a bona fide national holiday.

The first formal observance of his birthday took place in 1865, the year after his assassination, when both houses of Congress gathered for a memorial address. While Lincoln's Birthday did not become a federal holiday like George Washington's, it did become a legal holiday in several states.

In 1968, legislation (HR 15951) was enacted that affected several federal holidays. One of these was Washington's Birthday, the observation of which was shifted to the third Monday in February each year whether or not it fell on the 22nd. This act, which took effect in 1971, was designed to simplify the yearly calendar of holidays and give federal employees some standard three-day weekends in the process.

Apparently, while the holiday in February is still officially known as Washington's Birthday (at least according to the Office of Personnel Management), it has become popularly (and, perhaps in some cases at the state level, legally) known as "President's Day." This has made the third Monday in February a day for honoring both Washington and Lincoln, as well as all the other men who have served as president. ~Patriotism.org

Our plans were given to 4 qualified general contractors and a bid closing date of January 31st was given to them. I am writing this article on the 2nd of January and for that reason cannot tell you this month exactly what our costs will be for construction even though you will be reading it after the bid close date. The articles for the Antler Antics have to be to the editor by the 10th of the month preceding their publication in order for our members to receive them before they are too far into the month for which they are intended.

I can tell you that we are taking every precaution to make sure all of the items required for this project are covered. Some members have asked why we put the plans out to bid before we submitted them to the Thousand Oaks building department for approval. The reason is that the city will not look at the plans until a building permit is obtained. We don't want to apply for a building permit before we know exactly what this project will cost. There is still a chance that our costs will exceed our financial ability to service the required loan and we will need to re-evaluate our project. Once the permit is paid for, the city expects you to proceed. We do know that the city will find things on the plans that need to be corrected before building starts; that is their job. Our plans are very complete but a contingency figure will be added to our estimate for such changes as the city may require. This process is standard procedure. About the only agency that jumps into building before it has all of the costs is the government.

As I have written in just about every article to date, financing this project is a big hurtle we have to get over. We know we will need to borrow more money from either our members or a financial institution. Please help us by investing in our lodge's future by purchasing our bonds.
