The "OPERATION FACELIFT" committee has been set up to prioritize, recommend and oversee programs and work required to make our current facility more appealing to members and guests. There have been some comments as to spending money on our current facility. Until there is a definite decision as to what and where we are going, we have to assume we are staying where we are and will try to make the best of what we have!

Operation Pride—Help keep your lodge buildings and grounds presentable. There is a lot of loose garbage and litter around the lodge. Please help us pick it up and deposit it in a garbage container. Let's get some pride in what we have, make our facility more presentable to our members, neighbors and the community!

New Facility – A project of Operation Facelift could be relocation to a new property! Somewhere in our community there is a building and grounds that can be made suitable for our use. It is up to us all to be looking for this property. Please help us find it. When looking, some considerations to be taken into account are:

- Need a building approximately 12,000 square feet in size, preferably in an industrial area.
- Would like approximately 3 acres or more of land. Need separation from neighbors!
- Need parking available for 170 cars, some parking could be shared with adjacent facilities.

Parking – Area Clean up and relocation of the wooden fence in front of the rental property in progress. This provides more parking and an area for garage sales, picnic area, swap meets and other uses.

Operation Green Up – Now that dry weather is here, the "shaggy" fence behind the new flowerbed is to be painted so as to blend in with the new apartment buildings on both sides of us. Paint has been donated.

Outside Painting Of Facilities – A member has volunteered to paint our building at a minimal cost. Awaiting an estimate of his costs and when he could paint. Tom Hartin coordinating. Funding required.

Repair/replace Lodge Building Roof-Entire roof replacement is being considered. Either a new facility away from this site or a remodel of our current facilities is being considered. Funding to be determined.

Remodel Ladies Lounge – Need a major upgrade of this lounge. Preliminary plans are to move the inside wall, install a full handicapped stall and increase the size of the other two stalls. Leo Rodriquez and Terry Gicking are coordinating this effort. Funding is required.

Update Lodge Electrical Wiring – Lodge electrical wiring is old, overworked and tired. Duke Kopacz and Boyd Lindquist had electricians' survey existing wiring. Boyd Lindquist is coordinating. Funding is required.

Property Line Stabilization – Planning to go to the city and find out what the status of the project for the lot next to us is. Recycle area and new garbage container enclosure part of project. Tom Ryder is coordinating.

Saturday BBQ Area - Fence and Gate. - Outside patio and eating area is a success with Saturday people who come to partake in our BBQ offerings. Project is to make picnic area less visible to the road so people will feel more at ease while eating. Estimated cost is \$600. Tom Ryder is coordinating.

New Front Entry Door – Door to Lobby is narrow and not up to handicapped standards. Cost estimate is for approximately \$900 for a new door including installation. Terry Gicking is coordinating.



Quotes about winning are very well known, especially in the area of sports.

Green Bay Packer's Coach Vince Lombardi is credited with the now famous quote: "Winning isn't everything; it's the only thing". Sports journalist Grantland Rice wrote that, it's "not that you won or lost but how you played the game."

The modern Olympics slogan expressed by the founder Pierre de Coubertin: "The most important thing . . . is not winning but taking part in the Games." Has pretty much been replaced by the American Version "Go For The Gold!" and no one is quite sure who coined the phrase; "Ya win some, ya lose some, some get rained out, but you dress for them anyway."

Whichever phrase or slogan you prefer to recite prior to the "game", they are nothing compared to hearing your name, and your team's name following the words "First Place Goes To..." at the awards ceremony after the competition is over.

Most of us are well past the age where we can compete in organized sports. We're in the stands cheering our children and grandchildren. We're spectators at the World Series, Superbowl, and the 2008 Olympics. There are fewer and fewer opportunities for us to bring home the winning trophy, except for one-Elks Ritual Contest.

Charlie Richardson was a 25-year-old singer when he landed in the New York City in 1867. He was a performer and entertainer. His talent attracted a large group of theatrical performers who banded together and began meeting under the name of Jolly Corks. These men were the founding Brothers of the Benevolent And Protective Order of Elks. They were actors, singers and performers who not only had immense pride in their craft, but in the great charitable work that their new organization would contribute to their community.

Their legacy of Charity, Justice, Brother Love, and Fidelity continues today with all the great work our Lodge does for our community and each other. Their love of theater also continues in the beauty and meaning of our Ritual. For new members, this is their first impression of what true Elkdom is all about. The words have been mostly unchanged since the very first Initiation, and there is a reason why this first impression is practiced and performed by all Lodges nationwide. To continue the tradition of those who founded our organization so that new members will be reminded of the very special and unique organization they are now members of.

Just like Broadway actors, our Ritual "Team" of Officers not only had the task of memorizing the script, but also must

know specific body movements, word pronunciation, right down to the way we banged the gavels and do all of this "impressively". Every month when we initiate new members, and once a year when we compete at ritual contest, we are all actors performing a play which has been the longest running show off Broadway, and is never the exact same twice.

Our ritual team practiced twice a week for over four months. We drove to rehearsal in Santa Maria. Gave up Sunday afternoons and Thursday nights to rehearse the "show" for our Lodge, which would be a memorable experience for our new members. It was a bit disheartening that only 11 of our lodge members were in the audience the night of our performance, but it was also understandable. Unlike plays or movies on DVD which we view over and over and never get tired of (I've seen Les Miserable 12 times!), it seems our Ritual "Play" turns more people away then brings them into our "theater". It may seem to go on forever, but it really only lasts less than one hour. When you're the one on stage, it lasts even less!

Although we compete with other ritual teams, the real reason we memorize those words, rehearse for weeks and wear our "costume" tuxedo, is to impress the new members with the passion and love we share for our Lodge, our Order and the tradition which was started just over 100 years ago by a singer from England.

So, if you wish to experience the richness of a fantastic performance without having to stand in line or pay exorbitant prices for a front row seat, come see our Ritual. Our show is scheduled on the forth Wednesday of the month and is proceeded by a gourmet dinner and followed by the Good of the Order, fun, friendship and drink.

Jerry Rucker was born in Globe Arizona and moved to San Bernardino, CA six months later. After attending San Bernardino College, he joined the United States Army and became a paratrooper with the 82nd Airborne Division stationed at fort Bragg, North Carolina. He rose to the rank of Sergeant in the Military Intelligence Branch of the 2nd Brigade. He was awarded the Army Commendation Medal and the Good Conduct Medal. After three and one half years he returned to San Bernardino, California. He then received a Masters Degree from Arizona Pacific University and became a teacher in the Rialto Unified School District. He was site administrator for 26 years of his 32 years retiring as a school principle. He served 20 years as a member of the Rialto Child Assistance Board of Directors providing food, clothing and toys for needy families. He was President of this organization for 19 years. He also served 2 years as a member of the Administrative Advisory Committee for the Department of Education at Cal. State San Bernardino.

He joined San Bernardino Elks Lodge 3836 at age 21. His father, PDDGER Ray Rucker Sr., was his sponsor. He served on many committees at his lodge and after going through the chairs he served as Exalted Ruler in 1984-85. After being district chairman of many committees he was selected as Vice President of the Southeast District in 1989-90 and as District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in 1990-91. He served the State Association as Vice chairman of the Piggy Bank committee and Vice chairman of the Elks Restoration Trust committee. He served six years as a member of the California Hawaii Elks Major Project Board of Directors with one year as Chairman. He has been the District Leader of the Southeast District for the past 2 years. He also has served as the Grand Lodge Convention Coordinator for the past 25 years.

He has been married to his lovely wife Bonnie for the past 25 years.




