

The **"OPERATION FACELIFT"** committee continues to work on select projects. Work has been going at a snail's pace due to the lack of available workers. Need some volunteers! HELP

Operation Pride - The most important **Operation Facelift Project!** Help keep your lodge buildings and grounds presentable. There is a lot of loose garbage and litter around the lodge. Please help us pick it up and deposit it in a garbage container. Let's get some pride in what we have, make our facility more presentable to our members, neighbors and the community!

New Facility – A project of Operation Facelift could be relocation to a new property! The Exalted Ruler has set up a committee to coordinate all efforts to locate a facility for us. Somewhere in our community there is a building and grounds that can be made suitable for our use. It is up to us all to be looking for this property. Please help us find it. When looking, some considerations to be taken into account are;

- Need a building approximately 12,000 square feet in size, preferably in an industrial area.
- Would like approximately 3 acres or more of land. Need separation from neighbors!
- Need parking available for 170 cars, some parking could be shared with adjacent facilities.

The Exalted Ruler and several members are having ongoing meetings with a commercial real estate firm to determine the approximate worth of our current property and what might be available in our community. Also discussed were the types of funds available, if a trade is possible and/or financing of a new facility. Some interesting concepts were put forth and will be discussed in later articles.

Outside Painting Of Facilities – Dan Johnson crew is painting the Lodge and Office buildings. Now that dry weather is here, the "shaggy" fences will be painted so as to blend in with the new apartment buildings on both sides of us. Paint has been donated for all projects.

Parking – Area Clean up and relocation of the wooden fence in front of the rental property is approximately 80 percent completed. Some grading is to be done. The dumped BBQ wood is cleaned up so a overall plan can now be developed.

Property Line Stabilization – Material has been put in place for stabilization of existing property line. Planning to move a storage container from its location next to the wood storage area to the side of the property so as to create a site barrier screening our back parking area from traffic on Conejo School Road. Recycle area and new garbage container enclosure part of project.

Saturday BBQ Area - Fence and Gate. - It is about number three on our current priority list of projects planned.

Operation Green Up - Rick Herrera and crew are continuing to keep shrubs, flowers and flower beds looking great!

Repair/replace Lodge Building Roof – Effort is on hold at this time.

Remodel Ladies Lounge - Project is on hold at this time.


Update Lodge Electrical Wiring – Effort being studied and determination of extent of effort required to be outlined.

ANTLER ANTICS



Major Project Scores

Over a half - century of caring and sharing began in 1950 when a desperate shortage of trained therapists led the Elks to come to the aid of children with disabilities. From this need was born the idea of the mobile therapy unit, and the seed took root for the growth of the California - Hawaii Elks Major Project, Inc.

That very next year in Eureka, California, with only two therapists, two station wagons and nine children, the Elks' vision for a better future for children with disabilities began its first steps. Since then, the Major Project has provided services, at no cost to the families, for well over one million children during its 50 plus year existence. Our Major Project employs 34 trained professionals who, on the average, provide over 14,000 therapy sessions per year and screen 45,000 to 50,000 children for vision problems.

We serve children from birth to age 21 with homebased occupational therapy, physical therapy and speechlanguage therapy, focusing on those children in rural areas who do not have access to specialized health care. Our Major Project also provides vision screen in daycare centers, preschools, Elks lodge open screenings and health fairs, targeting the preschool age child for early identification of possible visual disorders. In addition, scholarship programs for students with disabilities and monetary grants to established hospitals for specialized children's care are in place to reach an even wider number of children.

The California-Hawaii Elks Major Project pledges its commitment to addressing the unmet needs of children with disabilities throughout the states of California and Hawaii by developing a program of supporting services to aid these children at no cost to their families and without discrimination.

In Arizona, Elks help children in two distinct ways. We have sponsored research at the University of Arizona's "Steele Children's Research Center" since 1992 with over \$4 million in donations. We remodeled and modernized the "Arizona Elks Clinic for Children and Young Adults" and provide funds for an endowed chair in Neonatology. We are also very proud of our Elks Youth Camp located in the Sierra Ancha Mountains in northeast Arizona. This camp is open and available to all youth groups throughout the state for a nominal fee. The South Dakota Elks Major Project has two parts. The Children Care Hospital and School serves over 1200 South Dakota children annually through evaluations, therapies, in-home support, day care, outreach programs, a school, a medical unit, and rehabilitation services. The Children's Home Society provides a home, school and therapy for children ages 4-13 with emotional disturbances and behavior disorders.

Laradon is the State Major Project of the Colorado Elks Association. Laradon was the first charitable organization in the Rocky Mountain region to offer support, guidance and training to children with developmental disabilities.

The Major Project of the New York State Elks Association is the Home Service Program of the Cerebral Palsy Associations of New York State

Indiana Elks State Major Project is in the area of Cancer Research

Maine Elks Association has two such projects; the Diabetes-Hypertension Van and the Maine Children's Cancer Program.

The Utah State Elks Association Major Project is Camp Wapiti. Located in Settlement Canyon near Tooele, Utah, Camp Wapiti (pronounced Wôp-i'-të — a Shawnee Indian word for "white rump" — a large deer or elk), the camp has a mountain setting, is close to goods, services, hospital and it is at a medically acceptable altitude for cystic fibrosis clients.

These are just some of the State Elks Association's Major Projects. Large or small, or our "Purple Pigs" will help them all!



Scouts Experience Camping

Thanks to the effort of many Thousand Oaks Elks, 3 boys from Casa Pacifica Boy Scout Troop 871 were able to experience an overnight backpacking trip in Los Padres National Forest. This is the first backpacking campout these boys have ever experienced.

Casa Pacifica is a facility in Camarillo that serves abused, neglected and severely emotionally disturbed children and adolescents from the Tri County area of Southern California. The thousand Oaks Lodge, through the efforts of Brothers Bill Sternberg and Bill Miller established a Boy Scout troop there several years ago and have been working with boys from the age of 11 to 17 ever since. For security reasons, the policy at Casa Pacifica is to not allow pictures or names to be published of these youth.

The camp chosen for this camp out was Oak Camp. It is located about 5 miles above Wheelers Gorge and at an altitude of about 4500 feet. The hike in is considered moderate and everyone made it into camp fine and a bit tired. After brief rest, a bit too brief for this author, activities began. The boys caught lizards and observed their first California Horned Lizard (Horny Toad). They thought they had discovered a new species. After catching and naming several lizards, they (the lizards) were returned to the brush and the boys were shown a rock area full of fossils. They dug fossils until their pockets were full.

On this camp out the boys had to filter their own stream water to drink, cook their own food on a backpacking stove and clean up after themselves; a new experience for all of them. Their favorite part of the dinner was dessert, campfire baked cinnamon apples. During their time in camp they fiddled with their new pocket knives, compliments of Max Maxwell, continuously. We hadn't been in camp 3 minutes before the first one tried to carve his initials in a tree. It is a boy thing and he was advised that if he desired to carve his initials that they could be carved into a dead, detached branch on the ground. That same branch could be either packed out or used to stoke the camp fire, insuring there would be "no trace" when he left camp. Be assured, the knives were all collected after the campout with no holdouts.

The hike out was mostly down hill and there was a promise of a stop at McDonalds in Ojai for lunch. Those two factors made for a very fast hike out. The boys were returned to Casa Pacifica and aside from a few new scrapes and a bag of dirty cloths, none the worse for the ware. I am sure this is an experience they will not soon forget. Thanks to everyone that helped make this campout come together.






