The "OPERATION FACELIFT" committee continues to work on select projects. As it appears the current facility is to be our home for a while, it becomes necessary for all of us to continue to make our current home more useable and acceptable for all members, new and old.

Work has been progressing slowly due to the lack of available workers. We need some volunteers! *HELP HELP HELP Operation Pride*

The most important **Operation Facelift** project is to help keep your current lodge buildings and grounds presentable. There is a lot of loose garbage and litter around the lodge. Please help us pick it up! Let's get some pride in what we have. Our facility is beginning to look more presentable to our members, neighbors and the community!

Many favorable comments have been passed to our members relative to the upgraded appearance of our lodge, both from our neighbors and from some of our weekly BBQ customers. The owner of the apartments across from the BBQ wagon stated that we have shamed him into considering some improvements to the exterior of his grounds, so he does not have the shabbiest appearing place in the neighborhood!

New Facility

Somewhere in our community, there is a building and facilities that can be made suitable for our use. It is up to us all to be looking for this property. Please help us find it. When looking, some considerations to be taken into account are:

- Need a building approximately 12,000 square feet in size, preferably in an industrial area.
- Would like approximately 3 acres or more of land. Need separation from neighbors!
- Need parking available for 170 cars, some parking could be shared with adjacent facilities.
- Would like to have some Motor home/ Overnight camping sites available

The "Find a new Facility Committee" members and Lodge Officers visited a building in an industrial area of Newbury Park that was brought to the Committee's attention by Rick Herrera. All persons that visited this facility believe it could fulfill our needs for a new home for the Lodge.

In order to determine if we can afford a new lodge facility, we need to determine the worth of our facility. The first step is to put our facility up for sale to find out what our facility is worth to someone. Many companies will give you an estimate of what they think a facility is worth. However until you get someone that makes an offer to buy you don't know. With the listing of our current facility for sale, a contingency clause will be included stating that our current facility has to be sold or under contract to be sold prior to our committing to a contract to buy another property. It should be noted by all members that before selling and/or purchasing another facility, the membership has to meet and vote their approval or disapproval to sell and purchase.

I've just returned from Redding after attending my first Mid-Term conference. Mid-Term is the time when we look at what we have accomplished in the past, and what we hope to accomplish in future.

Over 700 Elks from California and Hawaii, and their spouses attended the Elks National Foundation dinner on Saturday night. We filled the Redding Convention Center on two floors! The energy in that room was incredible, and it reminded me why I was always so proud of the work my father did, and all the fantastic programs he was able to accomplish during his 50 year membership in our organization.

The Benevolent Protective Order of Elks Mission Statement reads as follows: To inculcate the principles of Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity; to recognize a belief in God; to promote the welfare and enhance the happiness of its Members; to quicken the spirit of American patriotism; to cultivate good fellowship; to perpetuate itself as a fraternal organization, and to provide for its government, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the United States of America will serve the people and communities through benevolent programs, demonstrating that Elks Care and Elks Share.

I know that there have been times when we have lost our way. That differences have divided us and personalities have clashed. We have faced difficult financial times with the passing of our bookkeeper, the loss of membership and decisions regarding the future of the building we all call OUR lodge. But it is time to put aside these issues and return to our MISSION which is why we all joined this organization. Charity IS the purest, truest, noblest of ALL the graces!

As the Chair of the Christmas Baskets this month, I am constantly reminded of the great charity work that our lodge and the ELKS organization contributes to our community. When I speak to the heads of the organizations who sent me their list of needy families, their voices are filled with enormous gratitude, and I feel extraordinary pride that the members of our Lodge can work together to bring holiday joy into the lives of so many who have so little. But it

has not been easy for us this year to raise awareness, or the funds necessary to accomplish our mission.

Since April, our lodge has scheduled fund raising events nearly every month. However, attendance has been, in a word, pitiful. Whether it was a conflict in scheduling, the price of the tickets, or just lack of interest, proceeds from the Cabaret Saturday Nights, Wild Women on Wine and our ENF fund raiser barely paid for the expenses of the food and entertainment. As I write this, there are only 35 tickets sold for the Charity Ball this Saturday. This is the ONE event where we raise the funds to pay for the food for our Christmas Basket delivery at the end of this month. I am hoping that by the time this article is published that we will have a full house at this event and raise more than enough funds to cover all expenses.

As for the Elks National Foundation, according to the ELKS.ORG website, our current ENF amount raised to date is only \$683.50, or Per-Capita: \$1.94! At the Mid-Term dinner, each District Vice President gave their report with per-capita amounts ranging from \$5.00 to \$11.00. I am, therefore, asking EVERY member to please put a \$5.00 or \$10.00 bill into an envelope and drop it off, or mail it to our Lodge by January 1, 2009.

That's all. You don't even have to get dressed or leave your house. Just contribute \$5 or \$10 to ENF so that we can reach our goal by the end of this year.

For those of you who attended the Charity Comedy Ball, THANK YOU! For those of you who didn't, I hope you will volunteer your time during the week of December 16 - 20 to help construct the boxes and distribute the food to those in need. A sign up poster will be in the lounge for all to add their names to volunteer. KEEP OUR MISSION of Charity, the GREATEST of all the virtues, in our hearts and in our lives during the holiday season and all year long.

In these very difficult economic times, one person alone cannot do very much, but together, as an organization whose mission is one of Charity, I am confident that we can put our differences aside, come together as ELKS and feel the true sense of our motto: Elks Care, Elks Share.

Dick Flake, PER 1974-1975, and five of his co-workers:,George Vivamore, Frank Rindone, Jon Sylcott, Robert Jennings, and Vern McNaboe started the process for establishing a new Elks lodge in Thousand Oaks. . Each gentleman donated \$50 to the expense fund. In an effort to gain new members they went after Stray Elks and met at Los Robles Inn. Next to keep meeting costs down, they began to meet at Du-Pars Restaurant. However Du-Pars had restrictions on fund raising at meetings. Thus a new meeting place was needed.

John Farhat, a member of Culver City Elks, had a tack room in Lynn Ranch and allowed us to meet there for free. Later by cigarette lighter, they inspected a warehouse off Skyline Dr. behind the Moose Lodge for possible purchase.. The property owner became a charter member and made them an offer they couldn't refuse. Thousand Oaks. Elks had a new home.

Moving to our present location was a feat in itself. Needing \$85.000 to purchase the 158 Conjeo School Road property, some members put their homes up as security against default of the loan. Bob Clark Sr., Dick Churik, Dick Flake, John Farhat, Jack Henry, Paul Jones, Erle Pitman, Frank Rindone and Don Steinhelper did so under the name" The Conejo Brothers." Thanks to them and twelve other brothers who each loaned \$1000.00 to the lodge, funding was guaranteed. The purchase of our lodge building and property was done. Total purchase price was \$97.000. I wrote this article to show why many of our members are very passionate about our present lodge. There will be more history of our lodge next month.


