

Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed our Declaration of Independence?

*Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died.

*Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned, two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured.

*Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

What kind of men were they?

*Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists, eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners; men of means, well educated, but they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

* Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

*Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward.

*Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge and Middleton.

*At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire on his home. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.

*Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died in prison within a few months.

*John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished.

So, take a few minutes while enjoying your 4th of July holiday and silently thank these patriots. It's not much to ask for the price they paid.

Remember: freedom is never free! And the Fourth of July has more to it than beer, picnics and baseball games!!!! *Lastly, Charles Carroll of Carrollton was the last to die. He did not lose his fortune, but prospered in Maryland. The plantation of Doughoregan Manor is still in the Carroll family today.

Independence..."We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness...."

They set forth a mission statement that begins: "To inculcate the principles of Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity; to recognize a belief in God; to promote the welfare and enhance the happiness of its Members; to quicken the spirit of American patriotism; to cultivate good fellowship: ...".

It is the result of these four qualities (or values), Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity, that sees us growing as a lodge.

These same qualities within each member entice us to gather together and enjoy each others company. It is Brotherly Love that fills both the meetings and our additional events with harmony and laughter, Charity that drives our efforts for good works, Justice that reminds us to play fairly when dealing with others and Fidelity that keeps us faithful to our word / commitments.

It is our differences in understanding and approach that keeps our lives, and our lodge, interesting and exciting.

If it's been a while since you've visited the lodge – know that no one can fill your spot and you're missed. If you're wondering how you can get more involved? Just ask. GLMA District Past Exalted Rulers

The West Central Coast District Past Exalted Rulers Association, better known as GLMA, is alive and supporting the West Central District Lodges in many ways. Some to be noted are:

District Ritual Contest – GLMA donated approximately \$5,000 to offset Ritual contest expenses this year. That saved each of our lodges \$417 for their use in supporting other Elk activities in their Lodge's area

District Hoop Shoot Finals – GLMA covered \$1,335 of the District Hoop Shoot costs. Another \$112 savings for your lodge.

District Directories – GLMA published and paid \$843 for the printing of the District Directory. A \$70 savings.

Boy/Girl Scout Recognition Trophies - GLMA paid \$390, a \$33 savings per lodge.

Convention Hospitality Rooms – GLMA covered \$1,040 (\$87 per lodge) for the district hospitality rooms. This room provides our members attendees and guests an area to relax and showoff of our District!

This year's State Convention Hospitality room was one of the best ever! It was manned at all times by members of all twelve lodges and was visited by many Elks dignitaries'. Grand Exalted Ruler James Nichelson and his party were in attendance for the Eleven O'clock Toast one evening. So a GREAT BIG THANKS to all members that worked the room, especially to Dennis and Adelaide Wavra who coordinated, set up and made sure the room was at all times able to receive and host members and guests.

And where does GLMA get the funds for supporting the Twelve Lodges in our District? From GLMA members dues and from GLMA's yearly Fund Raising Dinner! This year, 2010, the GLMA fund raiser dinner will be held again in the Santa Ynez Valley at the Solvang Veterans Memorial Building on August 29, 2010 with the Santa Ynez Elks hosting.

OUR BEGININGS

For a few months now I've been searching the archives to bring you the history of our Lodge or the Elks themselves. Many stories of our beginning have made their way around the Lodge many times. True the Elks were started by a group of men that called themselves the "Jolly Corks". **But Why?** I wanted to know more.

It's November 15 1867 just a few years after the Civil War, Charles Vivian arrives in New York City. Charles is an entertainer and toured the music halls of his native London. He was looking for opportunities in American entertainment. Not knowing what to do, he had no job, or no place to stay. Charles was given a handbill advertising John Ireland's Star Hotel and Chop Shop. He found it and as he entered the doorway. The voices and warmth surrounded him and brought back memories of his favorite pub back in London. He walked up to the mahogany bar and ordered a schooner of ale and began to sip from its foamy edge. Charles soon noticed an argument between the piano player and another ornately vested individual with bushy eyebrows who scowled to the bartender. "I fired the entertainment for tonight. We have a full house. What do we do now". A smile crept onto Vivian's face which didn't escape the big mans notice. Turning to Vivian he asked "What are you finding so funny, little man". It took some fast talking but Vivian debuted that night. His tenor voice and repertoire of new songs wove a spell of enchantment over the crowd that night. Charles Vivian became a huge success starting with a 9 week engagement at Butler's American Theater three days later.

But more important he attracted a large group of theatrical folk and set up regular meetings under the name of the Jolly Corks, an informal society Vivian belonged to in London. How this group evolved into the Elks started two days later after Vivian walked into the Star Chop Shop House. That Sunday, November, 17 Vivian awoke to head down to the Star but found it closed. Vivian then learned of a "Blue Law" that with in the city limits of New York. All saloons and music halls are closed on Sundays. Vivian began planning a solution to this problem.

He started the practice of storing up a bountiful supply of food and beverages before the next Sunday rolled around. He succeeded in getting the message out to a dozen other entertainers from his new circle of friends. They met in the attic of his boarding house on Sunday December 15th. One month after setting foot in America, the first real meeting of the Jolly Corks took place. Each of the talented attendees added a large share of merriment to produce an impromptu variety show. Soon the word was out: The Jolly Corks had the finest and only variety show in town on Sundays. Each Cork was allowed to bring guests, prospective members. Their numbers grew and they moved to a storage loft over Paul Sommers's saloon. Jolly Corks were born. Next month Corks to Elks. **Stay tuned.**
