Dear Colleagues,

Generally meetings of organizations have been a mechanism to acquaint all members of current activities, accomplishments, approvals of key concerns, and updates of beneficial plans for the entire body. A major ingredient of successful bodies is commonly called: brevity.

Recently, in hearing from a number of good members, we seemed to have developed some regular report givers who enjoy hearing their own voice. This has reached such proportions that some members are expressing they're being offended by those who practice such diatribes, and are suggesting we curb extremely lengthy presentations.

Comments suggest this is reason that we are not attracting larger numbers of attendance for our meetings. Others say they would be more interested if only they can enjoy shorter presentations by committee chairs and those charged with delivering special reports. Especially when piggy backing someone else' comments. It is said that such action to other's reports generally are a waste of time for everyone.

Some have stated they don't attend Lodge meetings because too many of the same speakers take an awful long time in giving simple reports. It has been remarked that these sessions force one to self promise finding something else to do on meeting nights.

One major measure of success is how many of our members are participating regularly. When we have fewer attendees we have a much smaller prospect audience from which to recruit more support. Let's all adopt the symbolic slogan, "Zip your Lip".

To combat such attitudes, which erodes our member participation, I ask those who are to deliver a message, to first make notes to yourself of what you want to say, and second, deliver your message in 1½ to 2 minutes of lapsed time. Rebuttals and questions to your message will be gladly permitted, but let's adopt techniques that facilitate, not impede, our meetings.

We have a dynamic body of intelligent members who can, and do, appreciate all presentations subsequently we should be cognizant of everything we can do to get them into more of our meetings. The most common denominator solution I am hearing is to get us there by speeding up our meetings.

To encourage adherence to this idea of $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 minutes I will acquire a three minute timer to start with each presentation and when it expires will gavel down anyone hogging the floor. Not to embarrass anyone, just to bring convenience to the rest of the attendees.

Further, we will request the Esteemed Leading Knight assess worthy and substantial fines against anyone for whom **continued on page 4**

David Naccarato, PER OUR STORY

War tensions were rising in Europe and in August 1914 the powers of Europe went to war. In April 1917 President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress to declare War. The United States was poorly prepared to fight the war. The Army had no hospitals to care for mass casualties. Like our namesake, the Elks, we defend and look after our own. The Elks in 1917 pledged one million dollars called "the War Relief Fund". The order was the first to arrange and equip two base hospitals in France. 70,000 Elks joined the military. Considering at that time we only had 475,000 members. More than 1,000 Elks died in WW1. The Elks offered to build a 700bed reconstruction hospital for the Government. The offer was gratefully accepted. At the time, the most effective service organization was the Salvation Army. They tried but they were overwhelmed. The Elks held fund raisers and raised \$1,060.000. In those days a \$5.00 daily wage was a rarity.

At the beginning of 1941 The United States air power was almost nonexistent. The War Department asked to Elks for help in the "Keep ém Flying" program by finding qualified candidates to enter the Aviation Cadet Training Course. More than 400 lodges got involved and the military was pleased with the results. Suddenly on December 7th 1941, Japan attacked Pearl Harbor. Our Grand Exalted Ruler, McClelland, called the President of the United States to put the entire strength of the order at the country's call. The Elks helped with Air Corp ground crews and the Naval Air Corps program. Again the subordinate lodges responded magnificently. In the fall of 1943 the Army and Navy each sent a special tribute to the Elks. The Army letter stated, "full credit for the success obtained in the recruiting programs."

In 1946, the Elks National Memorial was rededicated to the memory of these now-forever absent members. Grand Lodge asked that Rehabilitation Committees be set up in every Lodge , to make certain that no man or woman who had served the nation would ever be forgotten or forsaken by its people. In 1946, the Elks National Veterans Service Commission came into existence. In its first year the commission staged 2,000 programs in 152 hospitals in 41 states. In 1950 the Korean War broke out and again the Government sought aid. This time it was 3 million pints of blood for the wounded. By July 1952 it was a success. The Korean War ended in 1953. Still "So long as there are Veterans, the B.P.O.E. will never forget" is still the motto of today.

The motion to amend passed and a vote was taken to adopt the new Lodge meeting nights. The Motion Passed and With the approval of judiciary Robert Duitsman, this change will take effect April 1st 2011. First meeting in April will not be till the 6th of April. The 13th will be Officer and House Committee and the 20th and 27th also will be regular Lodge meetings.

In the October issue of The Elks Magazine was a full page ad stating "ATTENTION ALLELKS".

It talks about our future as the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks. Any and all input is requested and everything is on the table. This is your chance to be heard at a national level. The Grand Lodge Secretary is looking for ideas and suggestions to help reinvigorate our order. The deadline is December 15th. This is your chance to contribute to the future of the Order.
