

It's March Madness! Watch out for the Elks Ladies dinner on the first Friday of March to kick off the frenzy.

I know we all regard basketball as an all American sport created in America, but how many of you knew it was invented by a Canadian born professor at a Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) in Springfield, Massachusetts.

The following was taken from kansashistory.org. I hope you find it interesting.

Dr. James Naismith is known world-wide as the inventor of basketball. He was born in 1861 in Ramsay Township, near Almonte, Ontario, Canada. The concept of basketball was born from Naismith's school days in the area where he played a simple child's game known as duck-on-a-rock outside his one-room schoolhouse. The game involved attempting to knock a "duck" off the top of a large rock by tossing another rock at it. Naismith went on to attend McGill University in Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

After serving as McGill's Athletic Director, James Naismith moved on to the YMCA Training School in Springfield, Massachusetts, USA in 1891, where the sport of basketball was born. In Springfield, Naismith was faced with the problem of finding a sport that was suitable for play inside during the Massachusetts winter for the students at the School for Christian Workers. Naismith wanted to create a game of skill for the students instead of one that relied solely on strength. He needed a game that could be played indoors in a relatively small space. The first game was played with a soccer ball and two peach baskets used as goals. Naismith joined the University of Kansas faculty in 1898, teaching physical education and being a chaplain.

James Naismith devised a set of thirteen rules of basketball: *The ball may be thrown in any direction with one or both hands.

- *The ball may be batted in any direction with one or both hands, but never with the fist.
- *A player cannot run with the ball. The player must throw it from the spot on which he catches it, allowance to be made for a man running at good speed.
- *The ball must be held in or between the hands. The arms or body must not be used for holding it.
- *No shouldering, holding, pushing, striking or tripping in any way of an opponent. The first infringement of this rule by any person shall count as a foul; the second shall disqualify him until

the next goal is made or, if there was evident intent to injure the person, for the whole of the game. No substitution shall be allowed.

*A foul is striking at the ball with the fist, violations of Rules 3 and 4 and such as described in Rule 5.

*If either side make three consecutive fouls it shall count as a goal for the opponents (consecutive means without the opponents in the meantime making a foul).

*Goal shall be made when the ball is thrown or batted from the ground into the basket and stays there, providing those defending the goal do not touch or disturb the goal. If the ball rests on the edge and the opponents move the basket, it shall count as a goal.

*When the ball goes out of bounds, it shall be thrown into the field and played by the first person touching it. In case of dispute the umpire shall throw it straight into the field. The thrower-in is allowed five seconds. If he holds it longer, it shall go to the opponent. If any side persists in delaying the game, the umpire shall call a foul on them.

*The umpire shall be judge of the men and shall note the fouls and notify the referee when three consecutive fouls have been made. He shall have the power to disqualify men according to Rule 5.

*The referee shall be the judge of the ball and decide when it is in play in bounds, to which side it belongs, and shall keep the time. He shall decide when a goal has been made and keep account of the goals with any other duties that are usually performed by a referee.

*The time shall be two 15-minute halves with five minutes' rest between.

*The side making the most goals in that time shall be declared the winners.

In addition to the creation of the basketball, James Naismith graduated as a medical doctor, primarily interested in sports physiology and what we would today call sports science and as a Presbyterian minister, with a keen interest in philosophy and clean living. Naismith watched his sport, basketball, introduced in many nations by the YMCA movement as early as 1893. Basketball was introduced at the Berlin Olympics in 1936. Naismith was flown to Berlin to watch the games. He died in Lawrence, Kansas, in 1939.

Today basketball has grown to become one of the world's most popular sports.



TOMB OF THE UNKNOWN SOLDIER; How many

steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the unknowns and why? 21 steps. It alludes to the twenty one gun salute, which is the highest honor given any military or foreign

How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why?

21 seconds for the same answer as before.

Why are his gloves wet? To prevent losing his grip on the rifle. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time and if not ,why not?

He carries his rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

How often are the guards changed? Guards are changed every thirty minutes, Twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

What are the physical traits of the guard limited to? For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5'10 and 6'2 tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30" Other requirements of the guard is they must commit two years of life to guard the tomb. live in a barracks under the tomb and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform or the tomb in any way. After two years the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn. The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin. The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt. There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone, nor watch television. All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are President Taft. Joe Lewis, and Audie Murphy (the most decorated soldier of WWII. Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty. In 2003 as hurricane Isabelle was approaching Washington DC, Our Senate/House took two days off with anticipation of the storm. On the ABC evening news, it was reported that because of the dangers from the hurricane, the military members assigned the duty of the unknown soldier were given permission to suspend the assignment. They respectfully declined the offer, "No way sir!"

Soaked to the skin, marching in the pelting rain of a tropical storm. They said that guarding the tomb was not just an assignment, it was the highest honor that can be afforded to a service person. The tomb has been patrolled continuously, 24/7, since 1930

VETERANS' HISTORY— SIGNIFICANT MARCH DATES

March 1, 1941- Bulgaria signs the Triparlite pact, becoming part of the Axis

March 2, 1965- Vietnam War began

March 3, 1931- "Star Spangled Banner" made U.S. National Anthem

March 7, 1945- The Allies capture two significant targets in Germany: the Remagen bridge over the Rhine and the city of Cologne.

March 9, 1945- U.S. firebomb Tokyo. Kill 85,000 Japanese. March 11, 1941- The US Congress passes the Lend-Lease Act giving Roosevelt the authority to sell, transfer, or lease war goods to the government of any Allied country, thereby effectively ending American neutrality.

March 12, 1938- Germany invades Austria and annexes it. The next day on March 13, 1940 Finland surrenders to the USSR, ending the brief Russo-Finnish war that began when the Soviets invaded Finland on November 30, 1939

March 15, 1939- German troops enter Prague and complete the invasion of Czechoslovakia, ignoring the Munich Pact.

March 19, 1944- German troops occupy Hungary

March 19, 2003- Operation Iraqi Freedom began

March 25, 1941- Yugoslavia signs the Tripartite Pact, briefly becoming part of the Axis, but the German government is toppled two days later

March 26, 1945 US troops complete the capture of Iwo Jima from the Japanese at the cost of 20,000 American casualties. March 30, 1941- The German Africa Corps begins its offensive in North Africa. 1945 Soviet troops capture Danzig. March 31, 1939- Britain declares that it will support Poland in the event of an attack.

The Battle of the Rhine- The Third Reich was beginning to crumble in March 1945. Soviet troops were rapidly advancing in the East, capturing the city of Danzig. The Western Allies seized Cologne and crossed the Rhine River over the bridge at Remagen. American forces passed through the vaunted Siegfried Line with ease. Hitler ordered a final offensive in the East, in a failed attempt to save the oil field in Hungary. It was now clear that Germany would be defeated.




