## LEADING KNIGHT Dan Martyn

In any occupation, profession or trade, there is, hopefully, the enjoyable part of practicing, building, fixing or accomplishing a task, and then there is the business side of things. Most days hopefully we enjoy what we do, and then comes the billing, the accounting, the collections and so forth. And so it is with the Lodge as well. We enjoy the socializing, the events, our charitable works, but there is the business side to the Lodge as well. Without a sound business, the Lodge would flounder.

Our Lodge, like any other business, faces many challenges financially. We are operating in what some might say is an improving economy, but we face ever increasing operating expenses, taxes and costs for goods sold and supplies. One need only make a list of the bars and restaurants that have either closed or changed hands in our area to realize that operating this type of business in the current economic environment is difficult to say the least. Other Lodges in the area are facing the same issues as our Lodge, particularly with regard to the financial performance of their kitchens, and increased pressure to take corrective action from our District leaders and above. I am aware that other Lodges are rethinking their meal pricing and, in some cases, reducing kitchen service or raising prices across the board. Our Lodge is not taking such action at this time, but we are taking a hard look at our kitchen costs and expenses with an eye towards containing costs and avoiding unnecessary expense and waste wherever possible. In this regard, one of the recent actions taken has been to encourage dinner reservations on Friday nights. We have had tremendous member cooperation on reservations, and while we are still working out a few kinks, reservations have been working well and help us with our planning and avoidance of waste.

## PLEASEMAKERESERVATIONSWHENEVERPOSSIBLE.

As Chair of the Hospitality Committee, I have been involved with the Lodge kitchen and bar for the last 18 months. The kitchen, in particular, has been a real challenge. We try our best to serve a good meal at a very reasonable price to our members, and we recognize that a significant increase in kitchen prices would negatively impact a good number of members on fixed incomes who come regularly to the Lodge to enjoy a meal and socialize. We will make every effort to continue to serve a good meal at a reasonable price.

While the financial performance of the bar has improved, the Lodge still frequently finds itself short on operating funds. In short, we have been living, to some degree, hand to mouth. At the beginning of 2012, bar prices were adjusted, roughly half higher and half lower, to better and more fairly reflect the costs of the various beverages. At this time, given the continual increases in operating expenses and goods, the Officers have approved an across the board price increase of 50 cents for all beverages, other than coffee and soft drinks, effective May 1, 2013. Please remember that the price charged includes sales tax, which was recently increased to $7.5 \%$. Even with this modest increase, the bar prices at the Lodge are extremely competitive and lower than all or most other establishments in the area.

We thank you in advance for your support and continuing patronage.

Glass is sorted by c olor and put in barrels which are stored in the new storage building next to the permanent BBQ. Plastic and cans are separated and bagged and again stored in the new recycling center. Tabs are removed by Gerry Gilles and collected for the Ronald McDonald house.

Periodically the barrels and bags are taken to the recycling center and cashed in with the proceeds going to the scholarship fund.

I thought that it would be a good idea to start noting what veterans have done after their military service.

Bob Reeves, a Korean War Veteran with whom I have been working for more than 4 years, celebrated his $45^{\text {th }}$ year as owner of Bob Reeves Brass Mouthpieces (bobreeves.com). At 81, he is the world's best at making trumpet mouthpiece, still doing the custom work himself, and aligning the valves on trumpets. His consultation is like no other, generally at no charge. People like Doc Severinsen, Arturo Sandoval, Rick Baptist and Herb Alpert are among his old friends. His product is sold round the world, and when he and his staff can make the trip to Japan and Germany and to the International Trumpet Guild annual events, they are swamped with requests for valve alignments, mouthpieces and special requests.

When Bob was discharged in 1955, having served as a navy machinist for four years, he went to trade school at the China Lake Naval Test Station. He started playing the trumpet and met other trumpet players, and with his machinist background that eventually led him to make his own mouthpieces. Working with Purviance for several years, he obtained the patent for the Purviance mouthpiece, and still makes the original plus his own version.

Bob has worked with engineers and physicists to come up with his own patented H2Oil (oil \& water mix) for valves, and has an item list of nearly 1500 mouthpieces and other parts that he has developed. He can tell you more about what is happening inside your trumpet than you know yourself, including his famous "gap" test with a piece of paper. The gap left when the mouthpiece enters the lead pipe of the trumpet is measured in the thousandths of an inch, and he will be the first to say that no one can tell you what that should be, but he certainly will educate you.

Among those who visited his shop in Valencia, CA for the $45^{\text {th }}$ anniversary was Terry Warburton of Warburton Music Products who flew out from Florida for the event.
