I would like to start by thanking Jim Moye for the wonderful job he did in the last year in increasing the number of meals that we now have on the standard schedule.

We now serve dinners four nights a week, Sunday breakfasts, and lunches most days.

At first I thought it would be almost impossible to find people to staff all the positions necessary to provide all these meals, however, I quickly learned that there is no problem getting Elks to volunteer to help. People have been coming up to me in the bar, the lodge room, the patio, the kitchen, and calling me at home and offering to help. And when I ask someone to help, I rarely get a no.

But I have found one problem. Every once in a while a Friday or Saturday night dinner will do exceptionally well, Friday night Fish Fry's usually do well, some Sunday breakfasts and Two Buck Tuesdays do well. But, in general, most of the meals do not seem to get a lot of support from the greater membership. It really does not make sense to have three or four people come into the kitchen and work for three or four hours and serve ten or fifteen meals. We need to either improve on the number of meals sold or stop serving some of those meals.

Think about it this way, if you are thinking of going to McDonalds or Burger King, or KFC, or calling Domino's Pizza, or just don't feel like cooking, think again and come down to the Lodge. You will get a decent meal for a decent price, drinks are available, you will see people you know, and you will probably have a good time.



Dues have been coming in as of April 1st, but after paying the Grand Lodge and State Association per capita, they will start to dwindle. The dues we collect are specifically allocated to certain expenses, including a \$22 assessment for Grand Lodge and our State Association. Even

though a member does not renew his or her dues, the lodge must still pay the assessment. Currently, we have 121 members who have not paid their dues. That's \$2,642 that we did not receive but have paid out for Grand Lodge and State Association assessments. We do have members that realize what Elks are all about. Along with their dues payment, some members donated to Veterans, Scouts, Major Project or ENF. This is what Elks do. We need to pay the bills to have a place to meet with friends and have some fun and do some good (happens to be the new ER's slogan). So, help us, so we can help the community and be the BPOE we are known to be (Best People On Earth).

All lodges in the California/Hawaii Elks Association donate to the Elks Major Project for disabled children. Also, we raise \$12,000 every year through the generosity of our members with the help of the El Konejo Kampers and the Elks Ladies. We have members who donate every month and their names are written in the Purple Pig honor roll. We thank you!

The order of Elks and our lodge support youth activities. We sponsor many Scout Troops. We have members who were Scouts and never got away from it. Service to others is addicting. We are very grateful to you!

One Major Charity of the Elks is the Elks National Foundation or ENF. Donna Leary is our lodge ENF Chair and has put on many fun activities such as the MASH 2477 party. A barn dance is scheduled on May 31. Along with their dues, quite a few members added a little extra for ENF. You Elks are awesome and you have our many thanks!

Any family who so chooses can have their deceased Elk memorial service at the lodge. We have a fund for that. There are members that gave a little extra along with their dues payment to go to the memorial fund—we so thank you!

Our Lodge gives out up to \$8000 in scholarships to high school seniors. Rick Herrera is our chair and does a great job with raising funds from the recyclables that our members bring in. We have members that went an extra mile with a donation to scholarship and youth activities. To all these

members, thank you for your continued support of our lodge programs. We cannot be successful without your help, and remember that funding for the good works we do is raised entirely through your donations, fundraisers and hard work. Thank you again, and again!

Purple Pig Update

This month we're celebrating **Mother's Day**. During this celebration we recognize mothers and the extrapolation from that is, we are all someone's child.

Every child is a mother's pride and joy and when that child is born, the love, hopes, and dreams we hold in our hearts for them are beyond words. But imagine if you will, a child that is born with physical obstacles, something that they must overcome in order to even reach ground zero to attain any of those dreams.

This is where the CHEA Major Project comes into play, and how your donations to the Purple Pig help countless children throughout our association.

In that light, I'd like to share with you a brief look at the different programs that are offered and how you can participate.

The mission statement reads like this, "The California-Hawaii Elks Major Project, Inc., a committee of the California-Hawaii Elks Association, pledges its commitment to addressing the unmet needs of children with disabilities throughout the states of California and Hawaii by developing a program of supporting services to aid these children at no cost to the families and without discrimination."

The programs that have evolved over the years **at no cost to the families** include "occupational therapists", "physical therapists", "preschool vision screeners", and "speech language pathologists".

Our Occupational and Physical therapists, teach children the basics including feeding and dressing skills, dealing with problems in sensory integration as well as learning or improving their motor skills by educating or re-educating muscles and increase strength, endurance and coordination.

Then there is the vision screening. Did you know that something as simple as a Preschool Vision Screening can prevent blindness? The goal of this program is to decrease the number of children at risk for amblyopia more commonly known as "lazy eye" and other vision problems such as astigmatism, hyperopia, and myopia by checking their eyes early on.

Finally, our speech-language pathologists work with a variety of communication disorders and coordinate a home therapy program with the parent.

It is through the **Purple Pig**, the fund-raising arm of the **CHEA Major Project**, and the dollars that **you** invest in the children of today that ensures their future as well as ours. Additionally, there is the added benefit that those same dollars you provide for the children are tax-deductible.

On a larger scale there is the **Bequest and Living Trust Commitment Fund** also known as the **BLT**. This program provides an opportunity for you to invest \$10,000 or more and receive an income of 7% annually. Plus, you get a tax break and yes, that money STAYS in the Commitment Trust, growing and providing for the future of the Major Project.

This is just a brief overview so that when you're approached to help feed the "pig" you have a better understanding of the services your money provides.

Ultimately, I want to thank our past, present, and future contributors for ALL that they do to help the children and for all that you do to help mothers have peace of mind knowing that their child will have a better future because of what the Elks are doing for their families.


