The closest bars were the Yukon Belle and the Lounge (yes, I admit to patronizing both). Area residents now have many more choices as to where they eat, drink, socialize and donate their time, talents and funds.

In addition, it is no secret that participation in fraternal organizations such as ours has been on the decline for many I suggest that you google "decline in fraternal organizations" and read some of the articles about membership losses among Moose, Kiwanians, Free Masons, Odd Fellows and, yes, the Elks. All of these organizations are facing the challenge of recruiting younger members as their core membership ages. So, how do we grow in our current environment? It is not easy. We need to encourage our members to participate in our recruiting efforts and focus on family and friends who will be positive additions to our Lodge. I think one thing is certain: no internet experience, no electronic game, no TV show or movie or Starbucks coffee klatch can come close, in terms of enjoyment and personal gratification, to the feeling one gets when they deliver toys and food to needy families, or when they give a handicapped child a ride on the Elks train, or when they hand a homeless veteran some food and blankets. These are some of the best things we do and, to grow, we need to emphasize and publicize our good works, involve new members and potential members in these community service activities and, I dare say, let them "feel the glow of Elkdom". You can't get that feeling at home on a computer.

As my year as ER comes to an end, I thank those members who have supported our efforts to improve the Lodge, turn things around and to have fun while doing good works for our community. While I have not succeeded in covering my initial to-do list (where did the year go?), I am confident that my friend, Jim Moye, with his crew of officers, will continue to make our Lodge a better place for all members.



#### The History of the BPO Elks Thousand Oaks Lodge 2477

The foundation of the this fraternal organization is found in the Elks Mission Statement: "To inculcate\* the principles of Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity; to recognize a belief in God; to promote the welfare and enhance the happiness of its Members; to quicken the spirit of American patriotism; to cultivate good fellowship; to perpetuate itself as a fraternal organization, and to provide for its government, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the United States of America will serve the people and communities through benevolent programs, demonstrating that Elks Care and Elks Share."

With that vision as the root of the organization Thousand Oaks Elks lodge #2477 became a reality with a dinner and dance taking place at the Oxnard Lodge on March 25, 1972 (at a cost of only \$3.00 per person).

The series of meeting locations began with Du-Pars Restaurant located on TO Blvd. but due to on-site fund raising restrictions it quickly became apparent that a new location was needed. Thanks to one of the members we found ourselves in a tack room in Lynn Ranch meeting for free. Still, a tack room isn't necessarily the place to grow an organization so the hunt continued. After an inspection of a warehouse off Skyline Drive conducted by cigarette lighter in conjunction with an "offer they couldn't refuse" the Elks had a new home. However, temporary.

Again in early 1973 members came to the aid of the lodge moving to our present location a former Lutheran Church at 158 Conejo School Road. Needing \$85.000 to purchase the property, some members put their homes up as security against default of the loan. Bob Clark Sr., Dick Churik, Dick Flake, John Farhat, Jack Henry, Paul Jones, Erle Pitman, Frank Rindone and Don Steinhelper did so under the name "The Conejo Brothers". Thanks to them and twelve other brothers who each loaned \$1000.00 to the lodge, funding was guaranteed. The purchase of our lodge building and property was complete and a new era began.

Changes to the current lodge building have continued over the years including some of notable interest. In March 1983, what is now the men's room was under construction. The project of John Nichols, the ER at that time, was a new men's room, something to replace the "one holer" which was currently in use. With donations of time and materials from many, it became a reality and the "Johns John" was ready for the Grand Flush Opening! The spring of 1981 saw the remodeling of the bar and efforts to upgrade and renovate the property continue this today. http://www.elks2477.com/about\_us/
