

From the Secretary I have written many times about how the Elks were started. I went searching as to why Charles Vivian came to America in the first place. He was very talented and I could not see why he couldn't

make a go of it in London.

Charles Vivian started as a comic performer and singer in the halls of London, where he became a crowd favorite and earned flowing reviews. A well known critic at the time made the statement that Charles showed more talent than performers three times his age.

Still opportunities weren't as plentiful as Charles would have liked. At the time 1866-1868, old pros such as George Laybourne, Alfred Vance, and Harry Clifton dominated the London stage and newcomers had to bide their time waiting for a big break.

In a hurry Charles set his sights on New York-the center of glamour and excitement where crowds from far and wide came to see the latest entertainment. After arriving he felt truly alone and asked where singers and actors congregated. He was given directions to the Star lounge and was on his way.

Charles was the son of a Clergyman and had been raised to live according to the eternal virtues-Charity, Justice, Brotherly Love and Fidelity(sound familiar) His parents were no longer on this earth, but he felt they were watching and helping him take the right path. Charles had 1 British pound in his pocket when he got off the ship after making his way downtown saw tall buildings with Greek columns and figured it was a bank. He asked for the exchange rate and was given 7 dollars for his British pound. He asked for every different type of coin available. Hungry he found the Star lounge and the rest is history. Dates to Remember (*Taken from VFW Calendar*) November 10, 1775 – U.S. Marine Corps established November 11, 1918 – Signing of WWI Armistice– Veterans Day November 21, 1983 – Granada Campaign ended

The Origin of Veterans Day In July of 1917, The Order of Elks appropriated \$1-million for the War Relief Fund. This Commission evolved into the Elks National Veterans Service Commission. It organized and equipped the first two base hospitals to reach France during World War I.

In 1918, the Elks built a 700-bed Reconstruction Hospital in Boston and gave it to the War Department. The Order also built a 72-roon Community House to take care of families visiting the 40,000 soldiers at Camp Sherman, Ohio.

The Elk War Relief Commission made 40,000 loans for rehabilitation, vocational and educational programs to disabled veterans who were ineligible for Government help or were waiting approval of their applications for assistance. The GI Bill, which makes funds available to veterans for education, had its genesis from this Elk program.

In 1918, when the Armistice ended the fighting in Europe a lifelong Elk, General John J. "Blackjack" Pershing, decided that the Elks 11th Hour Significance (which dates back to the 1066 Battle of Hastings) would be the basis for the signing of the Armistice. He chose the 11th Hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month for the signing of the Armistice, which is now Veterans' Day.

Catherine and I had discussed putting on a show for our lodge. That would either be an expense, taking away from the basket money or adding a \$7 price to the \$15 dinner ticket. So, Catherine and I held our, first ever, Grand Ole Opry at the lodge. Just for fun we call it Cat-Dave productions. (Sure, I'm 2nd fiddle but I'm not bitter)

The show started with hosts Dolly Parton (Cat) and George Strait (Dave) welcoming the crowd. After the welcome we had Dolly sing one of her hits, Jolene. I said HITS. You had to be there. The Highway Men followed with, Jimmy Miller (Willy Nelson) Paul Walker (Kris Kristofferson) Terry Gicking (Waylon Jennings) and yours truly as Johnny Cash. Marlene Nord rocked the house with "Down at the twist and shout" and as Patsy Cline, her

That's what we heard after our last production of the 2017 "Night at the Grand Ole Opry" for the Annual Charity Fundraiser. We are so thankful for the performers: Jimmy Miller, Paul Walker, Terry Gicking, Lori Hartin, and Marlene Nord. Without you we wouldn't have a show. THANK YOU!

Well, we've been putting on themed parties, shows, and skits for various functions and going-away parties for many years. But, it wasn't until we started the "Legends" shows that we decided to call ourselves, CAT-DAVE PRODUCTIONS.

San Francisco Lodge #3 is one of the first and continuously operating lodges in Elkdom. It's current building, at 450 Post St., was commissioned in early 1920 and completed in 1925. The lodge features a magnificent swimming pool where Olympian Mark Spitz swam as a child and his Grandfather was a member.

As I've mentioned before, the B.P.O.E. was started by entertainers known as the Jolly Corks. Why? Charles Vivian wanted to offer others, in the same field, stability in their unpredictable occupation. They never knew when they would be out of work, stranded, sick or broke. The Corks promised to help each other throughout their lives. February 12th, 1893 the New favorite, with "Walking after midnight". Lori Hartin, as Crystal Gayle, sang "Don't it make my brown eyes blue". I pulled off a George Strait hit, "Amarillo by Morning". Pam Price taught me how to have a southern drawl and to pronounce "Amarillo", which is "Amarilla".

Catherine and I sang a David Frazil and Shelley West hit, "You're the reason God made Oklahoma". Paul Walker, sounding very much the part, sang "Okie from Muskogee". Catherine Koeritz sang "Redneck Women" with all the props. Terry Gicking led everyone in line dancing to Achey, Breaky Heart complete with MULLET, and Jimmy Miller finished up with "You don't call me by my name". We led the lodge in "God bless America" and that was it, but no one left. The songs were sung, the basket winners drawn and the 50/50 was had, which, by the way, was won by Paul Walker who donated \$100 to the scholarship program. Everyone stuck

It was General Pershing who chose the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, Veterans Day and spearheaded the process to get the holiday on the calendar as a tribute to his roots in Elkdom.
